"Destruction on a mammoth scale, 87 separate crime scenes, 7 dead, political intrigue, searing heat, cloying humidity, a proud culture, dengue fever, a population traumatised, the CBD destroyed, a heavily armed military presence on the streets, a massive and sensitive investigation – AFP, welcome to the Kingdom of Tonga.....

In response to a call for assistance from the Government of the Kingdom of Tonga after the riots and accompanying destruction in Nuku'alofa on 16 November 2006, a RAAF C130 Hercules carrying 34 AFP members arrived in Nuku'alofa on Saturday 18 November 2006. The deployment, named Operation Tokoni (Friend in Tongan), arrived with a mission to support the Tonga Police Force to re-establish law and order and to support the massive investigation that was commencing into the destruction that occurred during the riots.

The team was made up of members from the IDG including the HQ, Operations Response and lateral members about to deploy to RAMSI; a specialist forensic team; a PSO Advisor and the AFP'S Pacific Islands Advisor. Within days the team had expanded to 61 personnel including DVI and IT specialists, a Liaison Officer from Fiji and a team of 20 protection officers.

On arrival the team quickly established itself, developing its liaison relationships and situational awareness. 'Hitting the ground' was a challenge in country new to the majority of personnel. However, all the usual initial deployment issues were quickly resolved through excellent team work; where to live, where to source meals, how to communicate, how best to assist our colleagues, and how to ensure our safety. The heat, high humidity, ever present swarms of mosquitoes and all the usual health issues that accompany a mission would be very familiar to all other AFP personnel who have deployed overseas. Unfortunately a number of members fell ill including one with Dengue Fever.

A Police Operations Centre was established in an empty house within the Police HQ compound. But we quickly outgrew the original accommodation sourced by Tonga Police for us; a small guest house named 'Angela's Place'. As the contingent grew we moved to the Nuku'alofa Ecumenical Centre, the only accommodation that could support our numbers as the largest international police or military contingent in Tonga. Unfortunately, even this accommodation was soon overwhelmed and many personnel uncomplainingly slept on the floor or 'hot bunked' until the numbers started to diminish with the departure of our specialists.
